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LETTER FROM CEO AND CHAIR

We are pleased to present our Annual General Report to you which contains the many highlights from the past year and demonstrates our progress against our strategic plan.

We celebrated the opening of our newly renovated Geriatric Assessment Intervention Network (GAIN) Clinic in The Village at Taunton Mills in the fall. The clinic now boasts 6 exam rooms, a multi-purpose program room, staff touchdown space and a waiting and reception area. Both the GAIN Team and their clients agree that the new clinic is both welcoming and functional.

November 29, 2019 was a significant milestone for Carea and its community partners. Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health announced the Durham Ontario Health Team as one of the first 24 teams in the Province to implement a new model of organizing and delivering health care. Carea has been one of the partners on the planning committee for the Durham Ontario Health Team since day one. We look forward to ongoing collaboration as we transition into a new healthcare environment that better connects patients and providers in their communities to improve patient outcomes.

This year marks the conclusion of our previous Strategic Plan (2016-2019). Under this plan, we saw numerous successes:

- Carea grew significantly from two to five sites
- Our Pickering site and Whitby's Taunton Mills GAIN Clinic were major capital projects that we completed and are now operational
- Recruitment was successfully undertaken for Carea's new Executive Leadership Team which included a new Chief Executive Officer and 4 Directors to strategically lead our functional teams
- We have seen a consistent growth in the number of clients we serve as we continued to expand our geographic location and continue to collaborate with new community partners

While we are pleased with our progress thus far, we felt it was time for renewal and to create a new Strategic Plan to guide our work as the Province embarks on changing the way health care is being delivered. We are very excited to launch our Annual Strategic Plan for 2020 to 2023. The new strategic plan will be our guiding compass as we continue to move forward in these unprecedented times. While our Mission, Vision and Values were updated, they still represent the core of Carea's beliefs and our commitment to build healthier communities. We are grateful to our staff, our Board and all of our stakeholders for their collaboration and input throughout the process.

We would also like to acknowledge the response by our staff to the COVID-19 pandemic. Our staff were quick to respond and find innovative ways to continue to safely deliver services and programs to our clients and community members. We are so proud of our staff's unwavering commitment to ensure our clients continued to have access to food, support, programs and high-quality health care at a time when other services were not able to continue to serve our communities.

We look ahead to our new fiscal year with the confidence of knowing that no matter what happens, Carea is always here for you and we will carry on serving our communities with pride.

OUR ORGANIZATION

At **Carea Community Health Centre (CHC)**, we work with our clients and community to provide accessible and equitable community based primary care and wellness services to the residents of Durham Region.







We support people of all ages and ethnic diversity. Our services include primary care, illness prevention, health promotion, community capacity building, and service integration.

Our inter-professional team works with our clients and our community partners to provide relevant care, support and wraparound services. Mental health support, Indigenous programs and LGBTQ2S are some of the areas we focus on as we enhance the health and social well-being of the communities in which we serve.

I started to come to CCHC children's programs with my two children who at the time, my daughter was 4 months old and my son was 2-1/2 years old. We were enrolled in all the play groups and pre-school, and any other programs run there. I got involved in the parenting groups, health groups, cooking classes, sewing classes, etc... They had many types of parenting work shops which I pretty much went to all of them. Just to be able to mingle with other Mother's and get encouragement from others that were going through all the things I was experiencing.

As an older Mom and in my second marriage, I went through postpartum depression and cried about everything. I didn't know at the time that that was what was wrong with me. It was through some of the workshops that I learned so much about mental health issues, which would in turn help me in the future with my daughter who in Grade 4 was diagnosed with ADHD/ADD, Anxiety and Depression. I can't say enough about Kim and Louisa who helped encourage and uplift me so many times over the last 15 - 16 years I've known them through Carea.

Before we move forward with our new Strategic Plan for 2020-2023, we'd like to share a very brief summary of some of the highlights of our Success Factors over the past 3 years.

CLIENT & COMMUNITY CENTRE SERVICES

As we expanded from two sites to five sites, we also expanded our programs and services. Our most recent Client Satisfaction Survey revealed that 97% of our clients rate their experience with Carea as positive and 99% would recommend us to their family and friends.

EMPOWERED STAFF & CULTURE

Each staff member was allocated funding to support their professional development. Over 70% of staff took advantage of this benefit! Staff also created a Social Committee that planned numerous BBQs, Potluck lunches and holiday events to engage staff and enhance Carea's culture.

ACCOUNTABLE & SUSTAINABLE SERVICE DELIVERY

Carea significantly increased its capacity by expanding to five sites from the original two. Our Children and Youth Mental Health Team moved into their own space in Whitby in October 2017. Our brand-new Pickering site opened in October 2018 and we opened a newly renovated clinic space for Carea's Geriatric Assessment and Intervention Network (GAIN) Team in September 2019. Not only did these three sites increase Carea's service delivery capacity, the bright, modern facilities also contributed to enhancing the client experience.

PROACTIVE COLLABORATION & PARTNERSHIPS

Internally, Carea continues to operate as an integrated team in order to provide relevant and needed programs and services in the communities we serve. Our Smoking Cessation program is a collaborative of our medical team and a designated Health Promoter, staff have created group mental health programs that include a social worker and a health promoter. Our Indigenous Team works together with our health promoters, our Diabetes Education Team and our dietitian.

Externally, staff collaborate with numerous community partners. The Welcoming Streets Initiative began in early 2019 and is a partnership with the City of Oshawa, the Downtown BIA and Carea. Our Community Advisory Committees in Oshawa/Whitby and Ajax/Pickering has have representatives from a variety of community sectors including police, municipalities, social services and residents.

RECOGNIZED IDENTITY

According to our Client Satisfaction Survey, 96% of our clients believe that Carea staff demonstrate compassion and inclusivity. We are recognized for our ability to care for our community. We launched a new website and multiple social media platforms in early 2017 and saw our rate of new users and followers increase by over 5000%!

We are excited to initiate our Strategic Plan for 2020 to 2023 and look forward to many more successes in our future.

We are very proud to launch Carea's new Strategic Plan. 



GAIN CLINIC

On Tuesday, September 24, we celebrated our Geriatric Assessment Integration Network (GAIN) Team's Opening of their New Clinic.

Situated in The Village of Taunton Mills, the new clinic gives the GAIN team the space they require to meet the needs of their clients.



Carea's GAIN Team can support clients in many ways. Holistic care involves looking at the whole person. Through the development of a therapeutic relationship, Carea staff identify who the client is, what interests they have, what is important to them and what their health goals are. The GAIN Team can then support them in many meaningful ways.

Mr. A, an 80-year-old gentleman, was referred by his family doctor to GAIN for cognitive decline and isolation. At first, he was very nervous about the upcoming assessment. Mr. A. had a long-standing history of depression and anxiety. During a random drop-in visit by Mr. A to find out where the clinic was, GAIN staff in the reception area helped ease his mounting anxiety about the upcoming assessment by engaging in a conversation about his love of art.

"I appreciate you checking up on me, but I don't need any food supports right now, I am doing very well...You guys have been so amazing, I don't know what I would do without you!!"

After having the Comprehensive Geriatric Assessment at the GAIN clinic, a number of contributors to his memory decline were explored with him, along with some ideas on how he could reduce his social isolation. With some encouragement, Mr. A rejoined the Oshawa Seniors Community Centre, is planning on joining Ajax Art Group, the Durham Naturalist Club and he is going for daily walks.

In addition, more discussion was happening regarding his artwork and the possibility of his watercolor painting to be displayed in the GAIN reception area. He was thrilled by this idea. In his own words he stated "Thanks for your support. I would like to bring a couple of framed paintings in to show you and then you can decide whether one of them might be suitable for hanging. I really appreciate your interest in assisting me in showing my artwork. You and your wonderful crew have given me a renewed sense of hope. How great this program is for people who are alone like me and really need this support and assistance".

OUR ROLE IN THE SYSTEM

DURHAM ONTARIO HEALTH TEAM

On November 29, 2019, Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health, announced that the Durham Ontario Health Team was officially one of the first 24 teams in the Province. The new Durham Ontario Health Team will implement a new model of organizing and delivering health care that better connects patients and providers in their communities to improve patient outcomes. Patients will experience easier transitions from one provider to another, including, for example, between hospitals and home care providers, with one patient story, one patient record and one care plan.

As part of the Durham Ontario Health Team, patients will be able to more easily navigate the system and experience smooth transitions between health care providers from across Durham

Region. The team will integrate several services including primary care, hospitals, mental health and home and community care, while focusing on improving care for older adults living with frailty and people living with complex conditions and mental health and addictions.

Carea is very pleased to be part of the Durham Ontario Health Team and we look forward to contributing to the transformation of health care in our Region.

COMMUNITY ADVISORY COMMITTEE – OSHAWA/WHITBY AND AJAX/PICKERING

As per the Board of Directors' request, our Health Promotion and Community Development Services Team created 2 Community Advisory Committees. One in Oshawa/ Whitby and one in Ajax/Pickering. The intentis to have 2 operational working committees that provide support and recommendations to address new and emerging, local community needs.

The Community Advisory Committees also provide a valuable opportunity to share information with both Carea's Senior Leadership Team and the Board of Directors.

The Community Advisory Committees consist of community partners, volunteers, Carea staff and a Board Member.

The Oshawa/Whitby community partners are: CMHA Durham, Oshawa Public Library, YMCA Durham Employment, Region of Durham, Community Builders Network of Hope, Feed The Need in Durham and 2 Carea volunteers.

The Ajax/Pickering community partners are: Pickering Public Library, City of Pickering, YMCA Durham Community and Employment, Ajax Public Library, Town of Ajax, Pickering Welcome Centre, DRPS, Community Development Council of Durham (CDCD), Ajax Welcome Centre and 2 local community leaders/volunteers.

The Oshawa/Whitby Community Advisory Committee chose to present free workshops at the Oshawa Public Library on a variety of topics. The first workshop focused on financial literacy and tax help. The second workshop was information about Human Trafficking. Future workshops will be moving to a virtual platform in the fall due to COVID.

The Ajax/Pickering Community Advisory Committee was developing a needs assessment survey to be distributed at both Ajax and Pickering libraries and other upcoming public events. Unfortunately, due to COVID, these encounters have been postponed. The Committee is still meeting to keep all partners up to date on what other agencies are offering in the community until regular programming and services resume.

WELCOMING STREETS INITIATIVE

The Welcoming Streets Initiative began in early the early fall as a partnership with the City of Oshawa, the Oshawa Downtown BIA and Carea.

The Welcoming Streets Outreach Team helps to bridge the gap between business owners and community members who are vulnerable in the city's downtown. The project is fostering a safe, inclusive and welcoming environment for all. By the end of the pilot project in April 2020, the

Welcoming Streets team had interacted with over 550 unsheltered community members resulting in over 200 referrals to support agencies. The Outreach Team also provided learning and growth opportunities through workshops for over 250 participants and they visited and engaged over 400 local businesses and more.









Carea's community-based outreach workers serve as a first point of contact for individuals who are unsheltered and vulnerable. The Team helps provide connections to other social services that individuals may need to access along with distributing harm reduction kits, personal care items, water, snacks, etc. Our Outreach workers also provide support, education and training to businesses in the area.



The City of Oshawa has extended the funding of the Welcoming Streets Program until the end of December 2020 due to its success.

CODE WHITE TRAINING

In February 2020, our Human Resources Team launched staff training on how to respond to a Code White situation. A Code White identifies to staff that there is an actual or potentially violent or aggressive person in the building. The training covered the response systems available (e.g. code white buttons, panic alarms) as well as CPI (crisis prevention intervention). Staff were trained on verbal and protective interventions. No staff were harmed in the making of this photo!



CLIENT STORY

THE DAY MY WORLD WAS RIPPED APART.

I will do my best to share my story and hope that your takeaway will be positive because that is the only thing that has carried me through. Our journey on earth has meaning that we don't always understand so we have to carry on the best we can and follow the path that is meant to be.

I will start off by saying my whole life has been plagued by violence and abuse. I was born into a family with alcoholic parents, I quit school and ran away at 14. I managed to find work and married a man I thought was good, until he turned out to be an abuser. At 28 I found the courage to leave him and fell in love with the man of my dreams. We moved in together and had our first child within a year. We got married and had two more beautiful babies, I thought finally my fairy-tale was here. It was finally my turn to have a good life! All three of my babies went on to get a diagnosis of Autism. I was lost, I didn't know what this path was going to look like, but I stood tall and learned everything I could about autism and how to support my children.

My husband was very supportive. Life is not easy and there is not much time for selfcare when you have three special needs children. I started to get depressed and someone told me to go to Carea, there I would find free counseling which was the only kind I could afford. I met with a counsellor who took the time to listen to me and help me understand the trauma I went through. She put me in touch with the Indigenous Family night program at Carea and some of the Women's Wellness programs. This all helped me tremendously! I was able to leave my younger children in caring hands at Carea while I attended some programs and socialize with other ladies. I found a community who helped get me in touch with my Indigenous roots. I found pride in who I was as an Indigenous woman. I grew very fond of many of the staff at Carea and continued to go until that horrific day...

I guess I was so preoccupied in caring for my children with special needs that I missed the signs. Or maybe he hid it so well that there were no signs, but on February 27th, 2019 at 4:15pm my dear, loving, handsome husband without any warning, took his life.

Our family was completely devastated. Now I not only had to deal with this horrific reality, but I had these three amazing children to think about. I did what I had to do for my children but walked the earth in a fog. I did not see myself being able to cope, not this time. Members of Carea staff surrounded me, and spent time with me, when I needed them most. I don't remember much from those first few months, but I remember feeling the love and kindness from Carea and our community surrounding us. Helping us, guiding us, even feeding us with warm meals and ensuring our family was supported.

I was guided to move back to the country to where I was raised. Everything has turned around in a positive way and I have also found love again. In the darkest time in my life, the staff at Carea made a difference. From the bottom of my heart I promise that I have never and probably will never find another place that helps so many people in the community with nonjudgmental, caring hearts. The staff at Carea helped me in so many ways during the worst time in my life- immediate trauma counselling, made calls to family, coordinated services, spoke to the police, even spoke to the Premier! I 100% with open honesty can say I would not be in this world today if not for the support of Carea.
